

DANA'S STORY OF HOPE

Dear Friends and Co-workers,

Dana Chapman of Anchorage, Alaska is awaiting a kidney transplant and desperately needs the help of family, friends and the community. Dana, a Compliance Officer with AKOSH, was diagnosed a year and a half ago with renal failure. Since that time, Dana has endured many medical complications and hospitalizations. She was also recently diagnosed with bone cancer. She had a Chondrosarcoma (malignant tumor) removed and is currently cancer free. But, she remains on dialysis for renal failure, 3 days a week, 5 hours each treatment, in addition to physical therapy 3 times a week because of muscle weakness due to the medications she must take. This condition is life threatening and the only medical option is transplantation.

Dana is currently on the kidney transplant waiting list at Virginia Mason Medical Center in Seattle Washington and her Aunt is in the final stages of testing to be her donor. However, even with medical insurance, many of her needs are not covered and must be paid for out-of-pocket. We anticipate substantial uninsured costs such as over the usual and customary for some medical specialists, co-payments and deductibles. In addition, because they do not offer kidney transplantation in Alaska, Dana and her donor must travel to Seattle and stay there after the operation, Dana for a month and her donor for a week and each must have a caregiver stay with them during this time. Insurance does not pay for her donor's lodging, transportation or donor's caregiver's expenses. Fundraising is thus essential to the overall success of Dana's Struggle. This is where your help is needed.
