BUSINESS MANAGER'S MESSAGE: STAYING POLITICALLY ACTIVE PAYS OFF



Last winter we urged you to be educated and active on issues that matter to Public Employees Unions. We asked you to make your voices heard. It is clear you listened and acted; your effort has paid off in a big way. We had a very successful legislative session, which is imperative as we begin to look at state contract negotiations early next year.

One of the biggest wins was a law to pay \$3 billion toward Alaska's retirement debt. Passing this legislation was critical for the financial health of our state. By analyzing, modifying and ultimately accepting Governor Parnell's proposal to transfer funds from savings accounts, the legislature has saved Alaskans hundreds of millions dollars over the next decade. The decision increased the funded status of our Public Employee's Retirement System and Teacher's Retirement System by nearly 10%.

Another success, Senate Bill 90 didn't make it past the Senate Finance committee. The aim of the bill was the roll the healthcare

For Local 71 members, that would have meant a reduction in benefits with higher payments for both employees and employers—less coverage for more money. Senate Finance members carefully looked at the costs and benefits of the bill and decided, with some encouragement from Local 71 members, that now is not the right time to make this change.

These successes show it pays to build relationships with your local representatives. When Local 71 members are politically engaged, we have the best chance of protecting our benefits and the values we stand for. Let's continue the good work.



VOTE NO ON AO 37 IN NOVEMBER

There will be several important issues on the November ballot this year. For union members like us, one of the most important will be a vote taken by Anchorage residents that could repeal AO 37. If implemented, this law would limit raises for city employees to one percent per year, prevent municipal unions from striking, eliminate seniority bonuses, designate the Anchorage Assembly as arbiter in the event of a labor dispute, and limit union contracts to three-year terms. This is an attack on our collective bargaining rights. We will need your help to assure this terribly conceived legislation does not become law. Get active, spread the word, and be sure to vote no on AO 37 this November.
